From the Desk of Fr. Joe:

The Players in the Passion of Christ

Palm Sunday and Good Friday part 1 of 2

The Family of Annas and Caiaphas controlled the High Priesthood of the Temple from about the year 6-66 AD. – 40 out of 60 years. One of Annas' grandsons, Annas-ben Annas, was assassinated for trying to promote peace with Rome as the first revolt was beginning.

Annas officially served as High Priest for ten years (6–15 AD), when at the age of 36 he was deposed by the Roman procurator Gratus 'for imposing and executing capital sentences' which had been forbidden by the imperial government. He is believed to have died about 40 AD.

Over the next fifty years, seven different members of the family of Annas also ruled as High Priests. From AD 6 to AD 43, they ruled almost without interruption, then there was a gap of 18 years, then another eight years of their rule.

High priests of the family of Annas

1. Eleazar (son): AD 16-17

2. Caiaphas (son-in-law): AD 18-36

3. Jonathan (son): AD 36-37

4. Theophilus (son): AD 37-41

5. Matthias (son): AD 42-43

Then about an 18 year gap

6. Annas II (son): AD 61-62

7. Matthias (grandson): AD 65-68 (son of Theophilus)

Known as Matthias Ananias (also known as Ananus ben Ananus) was killed by a mob of anti-Roman revolutionaries in 66 AD.

Continued persecution of the leaders of the Jerusalem Church

Stephen, the first martyr, was stoned to death in the year 35 AD by order of the Sanhedrin, (a group of 71 men, which was mainly comprised of the High Priest Caiaphas, Annas and other chief priests, lawyers (scribes), other Sadducees, and some Pharisees, who made decisions for the people of Judea. Annas dominated the Sanhedrin until his death, which was probably around the year 40 AD. The "bone box" associated with the family of Annas, identified as the "Caiaphas Ossuary." It was discovered in 1990 in Jerusalem and is now in the Israel Museum. It Saul, who became the Apostle Paul, held the cloaks of those stoning Steven, one of the first deacons, who ministered to the poor.

James the Greater (of James and John, the sons of Zebedee) was beheaded in 44 AD by Herod Agrippa to please Jewish leaders (The Sanhedrin) and suppress the spread of Christianity. This a time when Peter escaped from the same fate as a prisoner in Jerusalem, and went to preach in other places.

James the Less was martyred during a brief transition between procurators, while the position was vacant. Annas II, who was appointed high priest by Herod Agrippa II, seized the opportunity to have James the Less, the cousin, (brother) of Jesus, and others with him, stoned to death in the year 63 AD. Annas II ordered James to stand atop the Temple wall and deny Jesus before the crowd that had assembled. Instead, he proclaimed Jesus as the Messiah, which led many to convert. They threw James down from the Temple wall, and stoned him. James was still alive, after being stoned. Someone then took a club and finished the job. James had pastored the early community of believers in Jerusalem. He is also known as James the Just.

As we saw, Annas and Caiaphas, and their families were among those Jesus condemned when he "cleansed the Temple." They were wealthy, often cruel and dishonest, and closely collaborated with the Romans. They profited immensely during the 3 great festivals (Passover being the largest), when there were crowds are estimated to have been 180,000 people or more, The festival crowds were comprised of those who live in Jerusalem, pilgrim Diaspora Jews, and Jews throughout Judea. The typical population of Jerusalem during ordinary times is estimated at 25-30,000. However, depending on the different sources I looked up, estimates are over a million at festival times. I think the estimate I used is probably the best. The source: https://christianpure.com/learn/jerusalem-in-jesus-time/

The High Priests: bottom line is that Annas and Caiaphas, with the chief priests and the rest of the Sanhedrin, insisted Pilate put Jesus to death. The High Priests of the family of Annas also persecuted and martyred 2 of his Apostles named James, and the deacon Stephen as well. Jesus condemned the unethical business practices and the immorality of this wealthy minority. In John's gospel when Jesus is arrested, he is first brought to the House of Annas not far from that of Caiaphas. The high priest had his own Jewish troops in Jerusalem, his police, who were mostly Levites. These Temple Police and Roman soldiers were involved in arresting Jesus, along with Jewish authorities.

When we read the Passion on Palm Sunday, and again on Good Friday, we encounter all of those of the Sanhedrin: High Priests, chief priests, other Sadducees, (scribes-lawyers), Herodians, some of the Pharisees (although Pharisees were a small minority of the Sanhedrin). It was mostly this wealthy minority who financially benefitted most from the operation of the Temple.

The Chief Priests were an established group within the priesthood with the oversight of worship, control of the temple, administration of the temple treasury and supervision of priestly discipline. Centered in Jerusalem, the chief priests were members of the Sanhedrin. With the high priest, chief priests wielded significant power and privilege.

Elders - The Jerusalem elders were leaders of the prominent Jewish families of Jerusalem. Some of them were Pharisees. Elders served in their local village councils as well as those in Jerusalem. Their primary function was in the community and in the synagogue, thus they had considerable power over the daily life of the Jewish people. In addition to the Temple, there were synagogues in Jerusalem during the life of Jesus.

The crowds at the trial were mostly people from this group and others stirred-up by them.

AWESOME, WONDROUS, AMAZING A reflection for March 16

Amazing, incredible, astounding, awesome, miraculous, wondrous, unbelievable! These might be some of the words that Abram, Peter, James, and John would use to describe their experience with the Divine.

In Sunday's First Reading (Genesis 15:5-12, 17-18), we learn of Abram's encounter with the Divine. God appears to Abram and promises that his descendants would be as numerous as the stars of heaven and would possess a land of their own. To confirm these promises, God makes a covenant with Abram during which he experiences a deep, terrifying darkness and witnesses God's presence in "a smoking fire pot and flaming torch" that move between the animals he has sacrificed.

In our Gospel (Luke 9:28b-36), Peter, James, and John have their own wondrous encounter with the Divine. Jesus takes the three up a mountain where he then prays, but they fall asleep. When they awake, they see Jesus bathed in divine glory and conversing with Moses and Elijah.

The awestruck disciples then hear the voice of God proclaim, "This is my chosen Son; listen to him." Moses and Elijah are seen no longer, for they have been surpassed by Jesus.

Peter, James, and John are left speechless and unable to put into words what they experienced on the mountain. As Luke tells us, "They fell silent and did not at that time tell anyone what they had seen."

Their encounters with the Divine certainly deepened the faith of Abram, Peter, James, and John and redirected their lives. It led Abram to do what God asked of him. It led Peter, James, and John to see Jesus as more than their master: he was the fulfillment of the law and prophets, and he was the Messiah and the Son of God.

An experience of the Divine is not limited to those mentioned in the Scriptures or to the saints. We all can experience an encounter with the Divine. Such an encounter happens each time we come to Mass. When we gather with our fellow Christians, Jesus, the Son of God, is present. As he assured us, "where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them" (Matthew 18:20).

During Mass, we hear God's voice from the heavens as the inspired Word of God is proclaimed in the readings. In fact, after the Gospel is read, we profess that Jesus himself has spoken to us as we acclaim, "Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ."

During the Eucharistic Prayer, God renews his covenant with us. Not the one made with Abram and Moses, but the new covenant: our new relationship with God through Jesus Christ. As the priest prays during the consecration, "Take this, all of you, and drink from it, for this is the chalice of my blood, the blood of the new and eternal covenant."

In our receiving Holy Communion, we have an encounter with God even more amazing than that experienced by Peter, James, and John during the Transfiguration of Jesus. Jesus does more than shine with glory: he places himself into our hands so that we might receive him and become one with him. In this way, Divinity enters our humanity.

But since Mass is so readily available, we can take it for granted and fail to fully grasp what is happening before our eyes. If we truly appreciate what happens at Mass, we might describe it as Abram, Peter, James, and John may have described their encounter with the Divine. What happens at Mass is amazing, incredible, astounding, awesome, miraculous, wondrous, unbelievable!



Sad News - Our parishes mourn the death of Rev. Kevin Ashe who passed away on March 9th

Rev. Kevin Patrick Ashe, a tireless advocate for the poor, disenfranchised, and the environment, died surrounded by loved ones at the home he and his father, the late Thomas, built in 1958 as a summer residence in Brick, NJ. His parents eventually retired to Brick in 1970.



Fr. Kevin was well known at the Jersey Shore, serving several Roman Catholic parishes including, Sacred Heart in Bay Head, St. Catherine in Spring Lake, and St. Dominic in Brick. He celebrated his 60th anniversary as a priest in 2023. He was 87 years old.



Never hesitant to roll up his sleeves and fight for the poor, a Washington Post article from 1996 highlighted his battle with the state of NJ to turn a theatre in Union City into a nonprofit community arts center. The writer described him as "an Irish Catholic priest right out of central casting."

A graduate of Seton Hall University and Immaculate Conception Seminary in Darlington, NJ, Fr. Kevin began his ministry in 1963. He served in parishes throughout the state and immersed himself into each community living as a shining example of the Gospels in action. His humility was evident in everything and everywhere he went.

While at the Little Flower parish in Berkeley Heights, Fr. Kevin was named the Jaycee Man of the Year and was a member of the Union County Children's Shelter. At St. Paul's Greenville in Jersey City, Rev. Ashe established a housing resource center (Greenville House) for those in need and a municipal housing court. While at St. Paul's, he earned his Associates Degree in Urban Studies from St. Peter's College in Jersey City. As pastor of Holy Family Church in Union City, he established the Park Performing Arts Center, the subject of the brouhaha covered by the Washington Post, and served as chaplain to the Police and Fire Departments.

Fr. Kevin received a Lifetime Achievement Award for establishing the Park Performing Arts Center and America's longest running production of the Passion Play, which was named one of the top 100 tours from the American Bus Association. Raising more than \$1 million for capital improvements and expanded programs at the Park, he brought arts programs into an urban area lacking cultural opportunities and became a hero to the largely Latino community. He established the Northeast Folk Art Center and subsequently was given the prestigious Governor's Tourism Award.

More recently, upon his retiring as full-time executive director of the Park, Fr. Kevin turned his time and attention to the poor at the Jersey Shore, becoming a founding member of Seeds of Service in Brick, which advocates and distributes food, clothing, and household items to the sick, the poor, and the needy. He also served on the NJ Board of Americas Gleaned Seafood, which takes bycatch and distributes it to the hungry.

An avid outdoors man, who loved to ramble through the woods, sail, ski, hunt, and traveling the world, Rev. Ashe also served on the Brick Open Space Savers, a citizens advisory group that evaluates properties for potential acquisition to support open space, conservation, and recreation.

Fr. Kevin will be sorely missed. His sermons that spread the message of tolerance, love, mercy, and welcome will be remembered. May we live up to his expectations and follow his example.

He is pre-deceased by his father, Thomas, and mother, Catherine nee' Malloy and his sister Catherine. He has many loving cousins here and in Ireland.






Going to the Hospital?

If you are scheduled to go to the hospital it is good to go to confession before you go. If you are having a scheduled surgery you might want to be anointed before you go. You can do this by calling the parish office and arranging a time with Fr. Joe or Fr. Joy.

When you arrive at the hospital or if an emergency arises make sure that you or a family member let them know that you are Catholic and that you would like an anointing, Holy Communion and a visit by the Catholic priest chaplain.

These steps are <u>important</u> because HIPPA and Covid Restrictions. The hospital often restrict chaplaincy to priests they have on call. In case you cannot get the hospital to respond to your needs, please call the parish office and we will assist you in getting the spiritual help you need, or we will respond ourselves as best we can!
