Who is a Deacon? What is a deacon and what does he do?

The word “deacon” is derived from the Greek words diakonia, service, and diakonos, variously translated as servant, helper, attendant, or minister. Phil 1:1 acknowledges the evolving concept of diaconal ministry in the early Church, and 1 Tim 3:8-10,12-13 lists the necessary qualifications for the office of deacon once it had become more formally established.

The diaconate, deacon, is conferred by a bishop by the laying on of hands, and it is one of the three degrees of the Sacrament of Holy Orders. The other two degrees are the presbyterate, priesthood, and the episcopate, bishop. The diaconate is a degree of service, while the presbyterate and the episcopate are degrees of priesthood. Deacons, then, are ordained clergy who are not priests, and their special role is to assist priests.

- A deacon assists the priest at Mass when he offers the invocations of the Penitential Rite, proclaims the Gospel, preaches the homily occasionally, reads the petitions of the General Intercessions, receives the gifts, prepares the altar, assists with incensing, gives instructions regarding posture and movement, distributes Holy Communion, and dismisses the assembly.
- A deacon assists the priest outside of Mass when he administers the Sacrament of Baptism; brings Viaticum to the dying; presides for prayer services; officiates at wakes, funerals, and burial services; and witnesses marriages. Deacons are able to bless religious articles.
- As ministers of service, there are many options for deacons to perform charitable good works: outreach to the poor; the visitation of the sick, either at home, in nursing homes, or in hospitals; the care of inmates in prisons and jails; the teaching of sacramental preparation and religious education classes; and various administrative duties; just to name some of the major roles.

A deacon is an ordained minister of the Catholic Church. There are three groups, or "orders," of ordained ministers in the Church: bishops, presbyters (priests) and deacons. Deacons are ordained as a sacramental sign to the Church and to the world of Christ, who came "to serve and not to be served." The entire Church is called by Christ to serve, and the deacon, in virtue of his sacramental ordination and through his various ministries, is to be a servant in a servant-Church.


What are these "various ministries" of the Deacon? All ordained ministers in the Church are called to functions of Word, Sacrament, and Charity, but bishops, presbyters (priests), and deacons exercise these functions in various ways. As ministers of Word, deacons proclaim the Gospel, preach, and teach in the name of the Church. As ministers of Sacrament, deacons baptize, lead the faithful in prayer, witness marriages, and conduct wake and funeral services. As ministers of Charity, deacons are leaders in identifying the needs of others, then marshaling the Church's resources to meet those needs. Deacons are also dedicated to eliminating the injustices or inequities that cause such needs. But no matter what specific functions a deacon performs, they flow from his sacramental identity. In other words, it is not only WHAT a deacon does, but WHO a deacon is, that is important.

Why do some deacons become priests? For many years ordained ministers "ascended" from one office to another, culminating in ordination to the presbyterate, or priesthood. The Second Vatican Council (1962 – 1965), however, authorized the restoration of the diaconate as a PERMANENT order of ministry. So, while students for the priesthood are still ordained deacons prior to their ordination as priests, there are more than 13,000 deacons in the United States alone who minister in this Order permanently. There is no difference in the sacramental sign or the functions between these so-called "transitional" and "permanent deacons."

Dear Parishioners,

Those of you who have seen the May issue of the Monitor have an idea of my background. I was asked to fill in a bit more about myself and what has drawn me to the Diaconate! My Catholic grammar school (Nativity-Midland Park NJ) was a perfect place for me. The school was a friendly place, with an even split of religious and lay teachers. I actually loved serving the daily Convent Mass; Mass with the Sisters and one of the young priests was a very reverent affair--one could feel the presence of God there. The Mass time was 6:45am and assignments were a week long--somehow it never seemed a hardship to me to walk the 1/2 mile to serve that special Mass at that early hour.

I mentioned my Uncle, the Monsignor, in the Monitor article. He and I spent a lot of time together. We would make day trips when I was younger and sometimes weekend trips when I was older. He was always reading at least three or four books at the same time! I was able to serve with him a few times on these trips which was always very special. I am certain as his nephew it helped me land a Rectory job during the first two years of High School to pay 1/2 of my Paramus Catholic tuition. I also loved Paramus Catholic. The Christian Brothers assigned there had a good handle on how to manage high school boys. I still remember the Principal opening our Sophomore year by reminding us that "sophomore" meant wise fool! What I did not share with the Monitor was that in addition to being Captain of the Football team and an all league guard I also gave the Valedictory address at graduation!

College at Dartmouth flew by! I eventually figured out how hard I had to work in order to get accepted to Med School. I also was exposed to "college level sermons" by the Catholic chaplain at the Aquinas House. The sermons were 1/2 hour of in-depth discussion of what the Mass readings meant and how they applied to me. Med School at Cornell also flew by. By this time, I had figured out that science did not have all the answers and that my faith would be a foundation of my doctoring.

I also met my bride of almost 43 years coming out of the Church across the street from where we both lived! We eventually settled on a Franciscan parish about 12 blocks away (St Stephen of Hungary). We were married between my third and fourth year at Cornell, I spent 7 years working in the Bronx (Residency and National Health Service) before settling close to where Barb grew up. We were both very involved in multiple ministries at our two NY parishes. I'll mention one of these: Teams of Our Lady. This group of couples, along with a Priest Chaplain met monthly for dinner, prayer, sharing and discussion. This group enabled us to be strong in our faith despite the prevailing culture that seemed to minimize God.

The Monitor article touched on our move here and I really feel the call I have heard for years finally became a reality! I am truly grateful for all of the people in our two parishes who have been so welcoming and so encouraging. Please pray for me and know you will be in my daily prayers.

WHAT INSPIRED YOU TO PURSUE A VOCATION AS A DEACON? "If not you, who?" It seems like I have been hearing this question for many years. I have always found great peace in prayer, but never thought I could set aside enough time to pursue this vocation. My medical practice barely allowed the time for a weekly choir rehearsal. It took more prayer and great encouragement from my wife to move to a practice situation that while challenging, allowed me to ask our pastor at the time, Father Doug Freer, about the diaconate. I have the great example of my uncle, Msgr. James C. Turro, who combined great wisdom and great humility in his vocation as a priest. In my mind, I can spend more time in prayer and add care of the spirit as a deacon to care of the body as a physician. What a fantastic opportunity. I am frequently humbled by the various trials my patients endure and suspect I'll be humbled as a deacon in a similar way. Fortunately, diaconate formation has provided many tools I can use in this vocation, and I have learned to trust God more and pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit.



Bishops speak of 'moral crisis' before March for Life in Victoria, BC

At a pro-life Mass before the March for Life in Victoria, British Columbia, Canada, Vancouver Archbishop J. Michael Miller prayed that those heading to the British Columbia Legislature "may be worthy and effective messengers of hope to a world where self-centeredness, greed, violence, and cynicism so often seem to choke the fragile growth of grace in people's hearts."

The acceptance of abortion in particular in the law and the popular mind is "a telling sign of an extremely dangerous crisis of the moral sense, which is becoming more and more incapable of distinguishing between good and evil," the archbishop said.

He told the pro-life worshippers that they are "praying in a special way that reverence for life will grow and increasingly be realized in concrete ways in our province of British Columbia and in our nation of Canada."

THE COACH A reflection for May 19, Pentecost Sunday

Every professional sport has a team that comes out on top at the end of the season.

In baseball, it's the team that wins the World Series. In football, it's the team that prevails at the Super Bowl. In ice hockey, it's the team that is awarded the Stanley Cup. These championship teams have extremely talented players. In fact, teams use scouts to discover and recruit skilled athletes.

Besides outstanding athletes, winning teams have something else. They have great coaches. Without such coaches, a group of talented players will not become a winning team. Coaches help players develop their natural abilities, overcome their flaws, and show them how to work together as a unit. Coaches motivate, encourage, teach, and promote team spirit. They help teams to learn from losses, appreciate their victories, and keep focused on the prize. Championship teams all have outstanding coaches.

This Sunday, Pentecost Sunday, the final day of this Easter Season, the Church focuses our attention on another kind of coach. In our First Reading (Acts 2:1-11), we are told that the Holy Spirit came down on the apostles as a strong driving wind and in the form of tongues of fire. Inspired by the Spirit, the disciples began to boldly speak in various languages of the mighty acts of God made present in Jesus, the Risen Lord.

In our Second Reading (1 Corinthians 12:3b-7, 12-13), we are told that the Holy Spirit enables people to profess "Jesus is Lord," unites believers as the Body of Christ, and gives them gifts for the benefit of the Church. In the Gospel (John 15:26-27, 16:12-15), Jesus described the Holy Spirit as the source of truth who testifies to him and his message and guides the Church.

The Holy Spirit is described as wind and fire and as the source of unity and truth. But the Holy Spirit can also be described in a way related to the sports imagery that began this reflection. The Holy Spirit might be seen as the coach that Jesus has given to the Church. Like a good coach, the Holy Spirit helps Christians to recognize and develop the gifts they have been given to build up the Church—to build up the "team."

Like a good coach, the Holy Spirit motivates Christians to work together to overcome the forces of sin and evil that are arrayed against them. Like a good coach, the Holy Spirit keeps us fired up. The Holy Spirit inspires Christians to keep striving and never give up despite the world's seeming indifference to the Gospel. Like a good coach, the Holy Spirit sends us onto the playing field of life, convinced that despite every setback, we will win. Ultimately, God's kingdom will come!

This Pentecost Sunday, we rejoice that the Lord Jesus has given his Church, his team of disciples, the best of all coaches: He has given us the Holy Spirit!
